**DETAILS OF INVESTIGATION**

**SA [REDACTED] Obtains WILDLIFE SERVICES' Depredation Reports**

On February 27, 2013, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service/Office of Law Enforcement (USFWS/OLE) Special Agent (SA) [REDACTED] contacted the U.S. Department of Agriculture/Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service's (USDA/APHIS) WILDLIFE SERVICES' office in Las Cruces, New Mexico, to request copies of the Depredation Reports which had been submitted by Wildlife [REDACTED]. SA [REDACTED] spoke with [REDACTED] and requested copies of the reports which had been submitted by [REDACTED] for January 19, 2013. SA [REDACTED] explained that the reports were needed as part of an ongoing investigation into the shooting death of a Mexican gray wolf. [REDACTED] agreed to provide copies of the reports to SA [REDACTED] and suggested that the reports be picked up the following day. SA [REDACTED] thanked [REDACTED] for [REDACTED] assistance and ended the contact.

On February 28, 2013, SA [REDACTED] traveled to the WILDLIFE SERVICES' office located at 1941 Copper Loop, Las Cruces, New Mexico, and obtained copies of two (2) Depredation Report Forms with attachments (See attachment #1, WILDLIFE SERVICES' Depredation Report Forms). The first report detailed [REDACTED] investigation regarding the cow carcass which had been discovered on the [REDACTED] Ranch in Catron County, New Mexico, on January 19, 2013. In the report, [REDACTED] estimated the time of the death for the cow to be approximately twenty-four (24) to thirty-six (36) hours prior to the start of [REDACTED] investigation. It was also noted in the report that the ranch [REDACTED] had reported seeing "wolves at [REDACTED] hdgs about one half mile from the carcass on 1-18-13." [REDACTED] confirmed finding wolf tracks at this said location. Though evidence was documented that wolves had been present near the [REDACTED] Ranch headquarters, [REDACTED] could not find sufficient evidence to indicate that the cow had been killed by wolves or that wolves had been near the cow carcass. The only carnivore signs documented by [REDACTED] as being present near the cow carcass were that of coyotes. Based on this information, [REDACTED] ruled the cause of death for the cow as unknown. The second report detailed [REDACTED] investigation regarding the calf carcass which had been located by [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] on January 19, 2013. In this report, [REDACTED] estimated the time of death for the calf to be approximately two (2) hours prior to the start of [REDACTED] investigation. [REDACTED] further stated that Mexican gray wolf tracks were present near the calf carcass and that [REDACTED] found "bite and rake marks on the ear and rear end with corresponding hemorrhaging consistent with Mexican Gray Wolf." The cause of death for the calf was confirmed as a wolf depredation.

**April 4, 2013, Interview of [REDACTED] Ranch [REDACTED]**

On April 3, 2013, SA [REDACTED] contacted [REDACTED] via telephone to request an interview regarding the events of January 19, 2013. [REDACTED] who had been identified [REDACTED] for the [REDACTED] Ranch, agreed to meet with SA [REDACTED] the following day in Quemado, New Mexico. SA [REDACTED] thanked [REDACTED] for [REDACTED] assistance and ended the contact.

**REPORT OF INVESTIGATION**  
**Title: MEXICAN GRAY WOLF #1288**

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On April 4, 2013, SA [REDACTED] traveled to Quemado, New Mexico, and, at approximately 1121 hours, met with [REDACTED] at the Largo Café located on U.S. Highway 60. SA [REDACTED] identified [REDACTED] as a Federal agent with the USFWS/OLE and explained that [REDACTED] wished to obtain some information regarding the events of January 19, 2013. [REDACTED] agreed to provide any information needed to SA [REDACTED]. The following information was obtained from [REDACTED] during the course of the interview:

- [REDACTED] explained that [REDACTED] the [REDACTED] Ranch, which is located approximately [REDACTED] New Mexico. [REDACTED]

- [REDACTED] stated that on January 18, 2013, [REDACTED] had observed a pack of wolves near [REDACTED] residence. [REDACTED] fired several rifle shots into the air to scare the wolves away from [REDACTED] property. [REDACTED] estimated that there were approximately ten (10) animals in the pack. [REDACTED] stated that [REDACTED] did not observe any radio collars on any of the wolves, though [REDACTED] hadn't put much effort into looking for collars. [REDACTED] stated that they were easily recognizable as wolves based on their large body sizes.
- [REDACTED] stated that [REDACTED] had discovered one (1) of [REDACTED] cattle dead, to which [REDACTED] proceeded to report the carcass to the Mexican Gray Wolf Reintroduction Project (MGWRP) based on the fact that [REDACTED] had seen a pack of wolves near [REDACTED] residence the day before. [REDACTED] stated that the area where the cow carcass was located was approximately one half (1/2) mile from [REDACTED] residence. This information was then relayed to [REDACTED] for further investigation into the possible depredation.
- Upon [REDACTED] arrival at the [REDACTED] Ranch, [REDACTED] showed [REDACTED] the location of the cow carcass in an area identified as the "Middle Pasture." [REDACTED] stated that [REDACTED] believed [REDACTED] had determined that the cow had been killed by coyotes and not by wolves. [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] then proceeded to attempt to locate a calf which had been seen the day before with injuries to its ear. The calf was later found dead. [REDACTED] stated that the calf hadn't been dead for very long and was still warm to the touch. It was during this time that [REDACTED] observed what [REDACTED] thought was a coyote running off in the distance. [REDACTED] observed the canine for a short time through [REDACTED] rifle's scope and then proceeded to shoot and kill the canine. [REDACTED]

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stated that [REDACTED] had also identified the canine as a coyote, which was approximately two hundred fifty (250) yards away from their location.

- [REDACTED] did not identify the canine as a Mexican gray wolf until both [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] walked up to the carcass and saw the animal at a closer distance. [REDACTED] stated that [REDACTED] was very distraught that [REDACTED] had shot and killed a wolf. [REDACTED] further stated that [REDACTED] stated numerous times that [REDACTED] was afraid [REDACTED] was going to lose [REDACTED] job over this incident. [REDACTED] stated that the wolf was very small compared to the animals [REDACTED] had seen the previous day.
- [REDACTED] stated that upon identifying the canine as a Mexican gray wolf, [REDACTED] immediately attempted to contact the MGWRP, but was unsuccessful. [REDACTED] then proceeded to collect the wolf carcass and move it from its original location. When [REDACTED] did finally speak to the MGWRP, [REDACTED] was told to return the carcass back to its original location. [REDACTED] was later advised to again collect the carcass and transport it to a location where [REDACTED] could meet personnel from the MGWRP. The MGWRP personnel would then obtain custody of the wolf carcass.
- [REDACTED] stated that [REDACTED] was unaware of [REDACTED] taking any type of measurements from the wolf carcass to compare with the injuries discovered on the calf carcass.

[REDACTED] stated that this had been [REDACTED] first incident involving wolves. [REDACTED] further stated that [REDACTED] had never had any problems with any wolves depredating on [REDACTED] cattle during the time [REDACTED] had worked [REDACTED] the [REDACTED] Ranch. [REDACTED] stated that [REDACTED] had received reports from the MGWRP of wolves being present in Chavez Canyon, but had never seen any signs of the animals on [REDACTED] properties. [Agent's Note: Chavez Canyon is located approximately two (2) miles due south/southwest of the [REDACTED] Ranch headquarters.] SA [REDACTED] thanked [REDACTED] for [REDACTED] cooperation and ended the interview at approximately 1158 hours.

ON 1-19-2013 IFT CALLED ME AND SAID THAT [REDACTED] ON THE [REDACTED] RANCH SOUTH EAST OF QUEMADO CALLED AND STATED THAT [REDACTED] FOUND A DEAD COW ON [REDACTED] PRIVATE LAND THAT [REDACTED] THOUGHT WAS A WOLF DEPREDAATION.		
I MET [REDACTED] AT THE [REDACTED] RANCH @ 11:30 AND [REDACTED] TOOK ME TO THE CARCASS. THERE I FOUND A 9 YEAR OLD ANGUS COW THAT HAD BEEN DEAD ABOUT 24 TO 36 HRS. I FOUND COYOTE TRACKS AND SCAT AROUND THE SITE BUT I COULD NOT FIND ANY WOLF TRACKS. THE RANCHER STATED THAT [REDACTED] HAD SEEN WOLVES AT [REDACTED] HDGS ABOUT ONE HALF MILE FROM THE CARCASS ON 1-18-13. I WENT TO THAT AREA AND FOUND WOLF TRACKS. ON PERFORMING NECROPSY, I FOUND THAT THE COW HAD BEEN FED ON THE FRONT QUARTERS AND NECK AND HEAD, ALSO THE BAG WAS MISSING. I COULD NOT FIND ANY HEMORRHAGE ON THE CARCASS. I DID FIND POST MORTEM COYOTE SIZE BITES. RULED UNKNOWN.

## SUMMARY OF INCIDENT (including preface and actions taken):

On 1-19-13 I was called by IFT to investigate a possible wolf depredation of a cow at the [REDACTED] Ranch, Southeast of Quemado, NM. The cause of death on the cow was determined to be unknown. After the investigation on the cow, the rancher said that [REDACTED] had seen a calf on 1-18-13, which was the day before, which had a bloody ear. [REDACTED] said it was about one quarter of a mile from the site where I had performed the investigation on the cow. We went to the area and found a nine month old angus calf that had been dead approximately two hours. We observed what turned out to be a female yearling wolf in the area. I could not receive telemetry on any collared wolves.

On performance of a necropsy, I found bite and rake marks on the ear and rear end with corresponding hemorrhaging consistent with Mexican Gray Wolf. Ruled: Confirmed Wolf Depredation.
